

ORDINANCE NO. 2006-1
TOWN OF RICO
AUTHORIZING PARTICIPATION IN THE
NORTH RICO NON-PROFIT CORPORATION

WHEREAS, the Rico Regional Master Plan, as amended through 8-18-04, states under Article V. Environmental Protection, Environmental Remediation, Goal D: "Remediate the environmental impacts of past human activity", Policy 2. "Support a new treatment system of the St. Louis tunnel effluent." and Policy 4. "Promote cooperative plans to abate and remediate environmental impacts caused by past mining activity.";

WHEREAS, Atlantic Richfield and Rico Renaissance desire to form a non-profit corporation with the Town of Rico to pursue voluntary clean-up activities in and around the Rico townsite; and,

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees finds that the participation in a non-profit corporation with Atlantic Richfield and Rico Renaissance will facilitate voluntary clean-up efforts in the Rico area and will thereby promote the health, safety and general welfare of the Rico community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF RICO, COLORADO, the following:

SECTION 1. PARTICIPATION IN NON-PROFIT CORPORATION AUTHORIZED. The participation in the North Rico Non-Profit Corporation is hereby authorized. The Town of Rico shall participate as a member of the Board of Directors of the North Rico Non-Profit Corporation. The Town Board may chose to withdraw, resign, or terminate its participation in the North Rico Non-Profit Corporation at any time which shall only require action by motion at a regular or special meeting of the Board of Trustees.

SECTION 2. INDEMNIFICATION. The Town shall only be authorized to participate in the North Rico Non-Profit Corporation if the By-Laws and other documents clearly state that the Town shall be indemnified as a member of the Board of Directors in accordance with Article 129 of Title 7, Colorado Revised Statutes, and that any rights of indemnification under such Article 129 shall not be limited or restricted.


SECTION 3. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon final adoption.


SECTION 4. POSTING AND PUBLISHING. This Ordinance shall be posted at the Rico Post Office and Rico Town Hall and published on the Town's website.

AND 12R, OF BLOCK 25, OF THE HANCOCK STREET EXTENSION MINOR
SUBDIVISION WITHIN THE TOWN OF RICO FROM RESIDENTIAL PUD TO
RESIDENTIAL**

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees held a public hearing following notice concerning this zoning, and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined that the new zoning is consistent with the Town's Master Plan and the Rico Land Use Code, and is compatible with adjacent uses, while promoting the health, safety and welfare of the Rico Community; and

WHEREAS, there are adequate public services and infrastructure to meet the needs of the proposed zoning.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF RICO, COLORADO, the following:

SECTION 1. REZONING. The Official Zoning District Map is hereby amended to designate the property depicted on Exhibit "A", and more particularly described as:

Lots 8R, 10R, and 12R of Block 25, Town of Rico, Colorado.


SECTION 2. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall be effective immediately upon final adoption.

**ADOPTING THE YEAR 2007 TOWN BUDGET; APPROPRIATING SUMS OF
MONEY; AND, SETTING AND CERTIFYING TOWN MILL LEVIES**

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees designated Michael England, as Town Manager, to prepare and submit a proposed budget to the Governing Body; and

WHEREAS, a public hearing was conducted on the 18th day of October and the 15th day of November in accordance with the law;

WHEREAS, the Rico Town Board finds that the adoption of the budget is essential to the provision of basic and necessary services and finds that this emergency ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the health, safety, and general welfare of the Rico community; and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Rico has adopted the budget in accordance with the Local Government Budget Law on the 15th day of November, 2006; and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Rico has made provisions therein for revenues in an amount equal to or greater than the total proposed described below; and,

WHEREAS, the 2006 valuation for the Town of Rico as certified by the County Assessor is \$6,017,758; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees, the following:

The Budget as submitted amended, and hereinabove summarized by fund hereby is approved and adopted as the budget of the Town of Rico for the year 2007. The Budget shall be signed by the Mayor and made part of the public records of the Town.

Section 3. CERTIFICATION OF MILL LEVIES

That for the purpose of meeting all general operating expenses of the Town of Rico during the 2007 budget year there is hereby levied a tax of 13.020 mills upon each dollar of the total valuation for assessment of all taxable property within the Town for year 2006.

That for the purpose of meeting all street fund expenses of the Town of Rico during the 2007 budget year there is hereby levied a tax of 1.785 mills upon each dollar of the total valuation for assessment of all taxable property within the Town for year 2006.

That for the purpose of meeting all sewer fund expenses of the Town of Rico during the 2007 budget year there is hereby levied a tax of 3.939 mills upon each dollar of the total valuation for assessment of all taxable property within the Town for year 2006.

Section 4. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final adoption.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF RICO DETERMINING IT NECESSARY TO ESTABLISH THE RICO DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY, DEFINING THE GEOGRAPHIC BOUNDARIES OF THE DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT AND SUBMITTING A QUESTION OF CREATING THE RICO DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY TO A SPECIAL MAIL BALLOT ELECTION ON APRIL 24, 2007

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, Colorado determines it is necessary to establish the Rico Downtown Development Authority pursuant to CRS sec. 31-25-801, et. seq.;

WHEREAS, CRS sec. 31-25-803 authorizes the Board of Trustees to create and establish a Downtown Development Authority, which Authority shall have the powers set forth in CRS sec. 31-25-801, et. seq.;

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees determines it necessary to establish a Downtown Development Authority for the public health, safety, prosperity, security and welfare of the Town of Rico;

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has adopted a Blight Study for the Rico central business district and declares such district a "Blighted Area" as set forth in CRS sec. 31-25-802 (1.5);

WHEREAS, pursuant to CRS sec. 31-25-804, it is necessary to submit the question of whether to establish the Downtown Development Authority to the qualified electors within the designated geographic boundaries of the downtown development district as set forth herein, at a special election;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF RICO, COLORADO, THAT:

Section 1. The above recitals are incorporated by reference in this Ordinance.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico believes it is prudent and necessary to establish the Rico Downtown Development Authority in order to halt the deterioration of property values and structures within the central business district and to assist in the planning, development and redevelopment of this district to benefit the community of Rico;

Section 3. The Rico Downtown Development Authority shall exercise its authority within the designated boundaries of the downtown development district

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1. The first part of the report deals with the general situation of the economy in the country. Section 4. The Board of Trustees hereby establishes the Rico Downtown Development Authority pursuant to CRS sec. 31-25-801, et. seq. and submits to the qualified electors within the boundaries of the downtown development district, as set forth herein, the question of whether to form a Downtown Development Authority pursuant to CRS sec. 31-25-801, et. seq.

Section 5. Pursuant to CRS sec. 31-25-804, and the Town of Rico Charter, Article XI, sec. 11.6, the Board of Trustees hereby calls a special election on February 20, 2007 for the purpose set forth in Section 4 above.. The Board declares that the calling of this special election complies with the Municipal Election Code, CRS secs. 31-10-103 and 31-10-108.

Section 6. At the special election, the Board hereby determines that the following question shall be submitted to the qualified electors (as that term is defined in CRS sec. 31-25-802 (9)) of the downtown development district, as geographically defined herein, by mail ballot:

Section 7. Any ordinance or resolution enacted in the future for the Downtown Development District, for the issuance of bonds pursuant to CRS sec. 31-25-807 through 815, shall specify the maximum net effective interest rate of such bonds.

Section 8. The special election called herein shall be conducted as set forth in Rico Town Charter, Article XI, Chapter 11.6 and pursuant to the Colorado Municipal Election Code, Title 31, Article 10, CRS. The Town Clerk is hereby appointed as the designated election official.

Section 9: Any protest to the ballot title must be filed with the Town Clerk by _____, 2007. Any protest shall be resolved by the Board of Trustees, following notice and a hearing, promptly thereafter.

Section 10: The Town Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to take all necessary and appropriate action with respect to the submission of Referred Measure "A" to the qualified electors of the downtown development district as set forth herein and the holding of the special election by mail ballot on April 24, 2007



AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF RICO, COLORADO
AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 2005-9 ESTABLISHING THE
BUDGET FOR THE YEAR 2006 AND AMENDING THIS BUDGET
TO REFLECT ADDITIONAL REVENUES

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees adopted the 2006 Budget for the Town of Rico by enacting Ordinance No. 2005-9;

WHEREAS, the Board finds it necessary for the preservation of the health, safety and welfare of the Town to amend the 2006 Budget to reflect additional revenues available to both the General and Sewer Funds;

WHEREAS, the Town has received additional Sewer Fund revenues in the amount of \$50,000 from Realm Realty to be applied exclusively towards preliminary engineering services for design of the Town's new wastewater treatment plant;

WHEREAS, the additional Sewer Fund revenues, as set forth herein, in no way effect local taxes or implicate Colo. Const. Article X, Sec. 20, and will be applied directly to preliminary engineering as set forth in an agreement between Realm and the Town;

WHEREAS, the Town has also received grant funds in the amount of \$99,206.48 from Mineral Leasing which are to be reflected in the 2006 General Fund Budget;

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained that the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico amends the 2006 Budget as follows:

Section 1: See the attached Sewer Fund and General Fund 2006 Amended Budget

Section 2: The amendments set forth herein in no way effect the taxes levied as set forth in Ordinance No. 2005-9.

Section 3: This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon final adoption.
